“Abuse” focuses on acts of willful mistreatment and not germane to substance use disorder

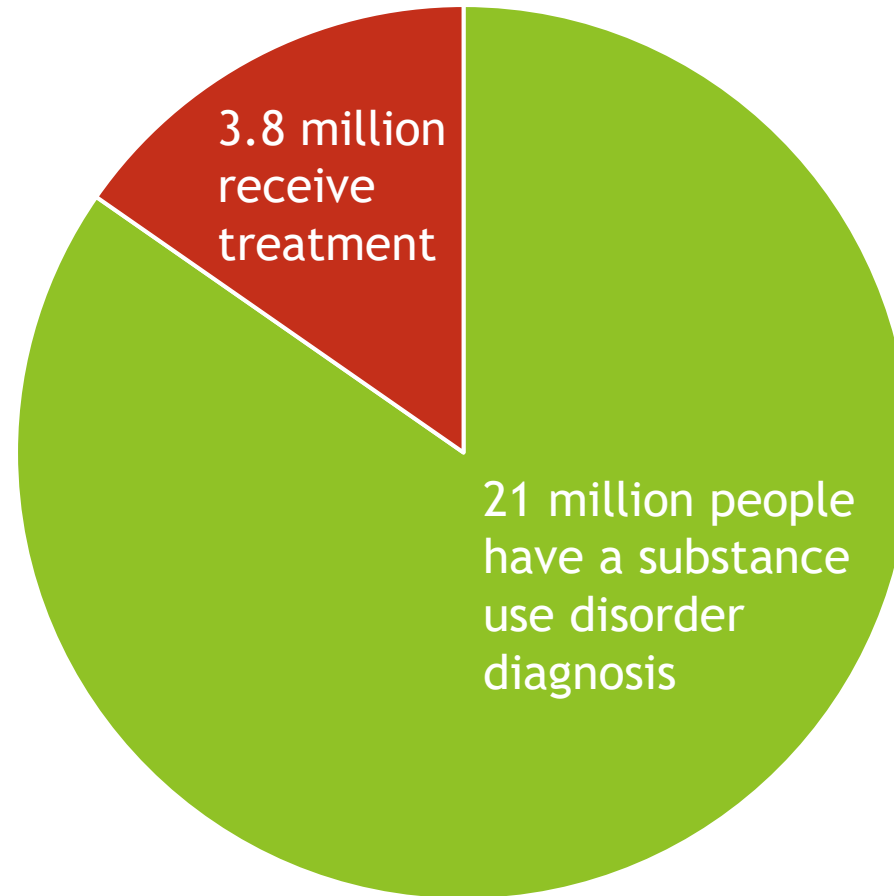
“Abuser” is morality-based language

# Stigma

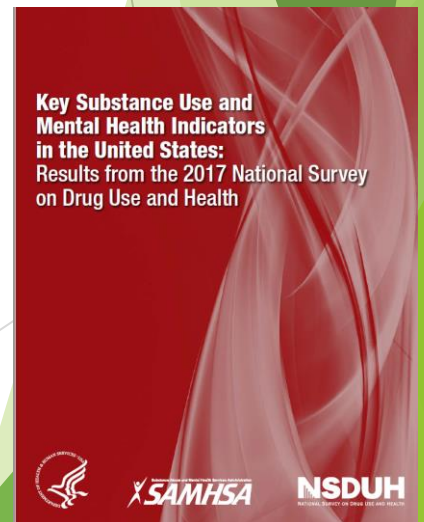

# Socially Constructed Ideas of Deviance

- ▶ Medical versus moral problems
- ▶ Labeling-interactionist perspective
  - ▶ Attributes and labels put on people
  - ▶ Significant events related to stigmatization of substance use disorder
    - ▶ Marijuana Tax Act 1937
    - ▶ Women's Christian Temperance Union's crusade for prohibition



# Prohibition

- ▶ Alcohol was consumed because there was a lack of clean drinking water
- ▶ Women's Temperance Christian Union crusade to provide alternatives to demon alcohol
