According to White:

"Abuse" focuses on acts of willful mistreatment and not germane to substance use disorder

"Abuser" is morality-based language




When Why

Socially Constructed Ideas of Deviance

- Medical versus moral problems
- Labeling-interactionist perspective
 - Attributes and labels put on people
 - Significant events related to stigmatization of substance use disorder
 - Marijuana Tax Act 1937
 - Women's Christian Temperance Union's crusade for prohibition
